Bridge of Flowers

Shelburne Falls, Massachusetts



To say that 2023 was challenging seems an understatement at best. Even as the bridge opened on April 1, unrolling a carpet of spring color into May, we were well into planning for major bridge structural repairs that would require us to remove all the beloved plantings and close the bridge from 2024–2025. We were also preparing for the annual plant sale, as well as a new venture, an art exhibit and sale.

The reconstruction project is being funded by a \$2.28 million state infrastructure grant * to the owners of the old trolley bridge, the Shelburne Falls Fire & Water District.

Cognizant of the impact the closure would have on the local economy, we sponsored a series of informational sessions throughout the spring for business owners and residents with representatives of the engineering firm Tighe & Bond, who will carry out the work.

Scheduling the project, we explained, was driven by the urgency of the repairs needed as well as the availability of state money. We invited all interested parties to work with the Bridge of Flowers Committee to offset our mutual losses with new ideas for attracting visitors during the closure.

The Committee spent much of April preparing for the annual plant sale in mid-May. Once again this year's sale attracted a large and enthusiastic crowd of gardeners on a bright and sunny day who bought nearly every plant.

The wet summer that followed did not seem to discourage visitors: 33,531 people from many different states and countries signed the guest books, nearly the same as the previous year, although the actual number is closer to 100,000, since about only one-third of visitors actually sign in.

Last spring, the formal dissolution of the Preservation Fund, a citizens' organization formed in the mid-1980s to raise money for bridge repair, resulted in modest funds from its accounts being transferred to the Bridge of Flowers' budget. We were also pleased to receive a generous bequest from the estate of the late Hale Johnson, a longtime resident of Colrain and a celebrated artist.

As the season wound down, our attention turned to planning for our first-time art exhibition and sale on October 14 and 15 and for the Herculean task of removing all plantings from the bridge.

The goals of the art exhibit/sale were twofold: to establish ties with the large community of artists and artisans who live here, and to create a new income stream for our budget. Ann Lofquist and Joanne Soroka, artists who also serve on the Committee, organized the event. Held at the Shelburne-Buckland Community Center, the show featured 109 pieces by 67 artists in a variety of media, each piece focused on the bridge or gardens.

Forty-two of the works sold, with the artists generously donating all or part of the proceeds to the bridge. Thanks to all who pitched in to make this event such a resounding success, plans are being made to hold another art show/ sale this year on August 16–18. Income will be particularly important while the bridge is closed.

When the gates to the bridge were closed as usual on October 31, a large and dedicated army of volunteers spent several weeks on "the big dig," led by Head Gardener Carol DeLorenzo and Assistant Gardener Elliston Bingham.

Members of the Blossom Brigade, the Bridge Committee, and the Shelburne Falls Area Women's Club, as well as residents and even several engineers from Tighe & Bond, dug and helped transport hundreds of valuable perennials, specimen bushes, and smaller trees to local gardens to be cared for until they can be returned to the bridge when it re-opens.

Some larger trees that can't be returned to the bridge found new homes. Unfortunately, the beloved wisteria that have long graced the mid-point of the bridge cannot be salvaged, but we hope to preserve portions of their uniquely gnarled trunks and make them available for other aesthetic purposes.

The gates re-opened very briefly in late November, when a holiday tree, donated by Apex Orchards, was mounted mid-way on the path, its wreath of white lights lit to coincide with the arrival of Santa as part of Moonlight Magic festivities.

With our plants all snug in their beds, visions of flowers danced in our heads, along with plans for a grand re-opening of the Bridge of Flowers sometime in 2025.






